FCITL Instructional Technology Leadership Award: Innovative Principal of the Year

Debbie Anderson, Santa Rosa County's candidate, encompasses all the characteristics of an innovative principal. She has served as a school administrator in Santa Rosa County for 13 years, 8 years as Principal at SS Dixon Primary School, and 5 years as AP at Berryhill Elementary School. Prior to entering administration she worked in special education. Debbie is a hands-on principal that any school desires; with a heavy focus on implementing technology. Mrs. Anderson recognizes that her students are "digital natives" and need the same diversity of learning at school that technology provides for her students at home. Understanding this need, Debbie instituted a plan of action that meets the needs of her diverse learners, incorporating flexible and alternative tools to interact with their curriculum. Her prior experience as a special education teacher influenced her drive to empower and engage students by utilizing their learning styles and interests. As a previous Staffing Specialist for the Santa Rosa County School Board, she guided and incorporated the development and placement of community resources to include assistive technology devices to help students learn. The vision created by the necessity for hands-on technology in the classroom contained a method for acquiring funding not supported by decreasing school budgets. Mrs. Anderson's primary and creative funding source, Haystackular, which received state recognition, enabled her to increase technology considerably in the classroom, keeping her promise to the parents of her students. Her contributions to developing communal ties and promoting a high level of involvement from students, parents, staff members, and business partners laid the foundation for making S. S. Dixon Primary a 21st Century School.

S. S. Dixon Primary School is located in the unincorporated community of Pace, Florida, which is noted for being the western gateway to Santa Rosa County. This small town school, which dates back to 1926, is adapting to meet the needs of its skyrocketing population. As principal, Mrs. Anderson realizes that recent research indicates a curriculum involving digital media could improve early literacy skills when coupled with strong teacher involvement. Her commitment to excellence for her school, students, teachers, and community has resulted in higher academic standards, directly affecting student achievement. Because of her knowledge, experience, and leadership, pre-school and kindergarten students showed increases in letter recognition, sound associations with letters, and understanding basic concepts about stories and print. These types of pre-reading skills are directly aligned to Florida's new Common Core Standards and impact more formal assessments such as DEA and FCAT.

Believing that technology would positively influence student performance as well as student behavior, Debbie has worked tirelessly to incorporate cutting-edge instruction in which students learn new things in new ways, so they can live and work in a changing world. With a focus on the core subjects in conjunction with addressing critical thinking and problem solving skills, communication, creativity and innovation, and collaboration, a transformation has occurred within the classrooms. She has promoted the use of technology with interactive Mimio bars and tablets, student response systems, Red Cat classroom amplification systems, document cameras, LCD projectors, laptops, iPads, wireless listening stations, digital storytelling, Brain Pop Jr., Discovery Education, Education City, and virtual science labs. By staying abreast of the latest academic research on best practices and resources, web-based educational software such as IXL Math has been launched within the classrooms to include a home component to help students learn and retain math skills, which has attributed to the 9.5% increase of students scoring at or above the expected proficiency level. The 9.1% increase in reading fluency among Dixon Primary students has been effected by such software programs as Raz-Kids.com, which provides readers with the opportunity to go online and listen to, read, and record themselves reading books written at 27 levels of difficulty.

The level of comfort that teachers demonstrate using technology at Dixon Primary School is directly related to the training facilitated by Mrs. Anderson. Her emphasis on continual professional development has been demonstrated through flexible scheduling of monthly trainings, using staff expertise and on-site coaching, and off-site development directed at helping teachers redesign their instruction, engage their students and improve student outcomes. Teachers are given multiple opportunities to learn and share best practices with their peers and to engage in hands-on learning experiences they can use in their classrooms. By using creative funding sources, Mrs. Anderson has recently been able to send more than twenty teachers to the Florida Educational Technology Conference. With every classroom equipped with iPads, teachers are now engaging in Apple Learning Labs, webinars, and technology learning communities.

Mrs. Anderson has increased communication with all stakeholders through her "Bringing It Home" initiative, which was conceived as a family-friendly innovative resource that would support school

improvement goals to increase parent involvement and enhance student achievement. This ongoing project was also designed to establish a unique communication tool for all stakeholders. The central component of Dixon Primary's website includes an array of parent resources that extend beyond the basics, allowing for interactive communication and innovative means of participation in school activities.

Throughout the year, the school website offers a variety of resources for parents, particularly those who have demanding work schedules or family responsibilities. We are able to keep parents in tune with school happenings, which reinforces the child's view that school and home are connected and that the school is an integral part of the whole family's life. These resources range from virtual tours to classroom events such as science experiments, student presentations, and student recognition programs. Parents are also encouraged to participate in department blogs and surveys that allow for interactive communication between parents, staff members, and community members. Educational components are included to assist parents in helping their children at home with reading and math strategies and providing available resources such as video-taped presentations.

More than thirty teachers are engaging in collaborative communication with parents through a private classroom website called Shutterfly, which combines photos, blogs, and social networking. Activities that occur on a daily basis are posted on the classroom site for parents to view and notifications are automatically sent to parents via email and texts, allowing students to share their classroom experiences with family members. Shutterfly has garnered rave reviews from parents and teachers according to surveys conducted by the district.

The "Bringing It Home" project was a significant collaboration among staff members who volunteered a total of over forty hours by contributing to the various website components, including a needs assessment and preparation of parent help videos. Community volunteers worked closely with our school team to assist with various technical elements, while parents committed to using the website. Through this communication and collaboration, family participation in school events has grown tremendously. For example, our "Bingo for Books" night attracted over 300 parents and students, the Pro Kids Show engaged over 200 participants and our February Parent Involvement Night drew over 300 attendees. Mrs. Anderson's goal is to continue to improve the efficacy of our website in order to build the bridge from school to home.

Debbie Anderson has succeeded in helping Dixon Primary become a 21st century school largely because of her innate ability to communicate her plans and goals to the parents and families of her students. As parents voiced frustration with numerous fundraising activities and state budget cuts severely diminished monetary resources for even the most basic school necessities, Mrs. Anderson seized the opportunity to adjust Dixon's fundraising model while intensifying parental involvement. With the help of Dixon Primary's School Advisory Council and its Parent Teacher Organization, Mrs. Anderson implemented "Haystackular," a comprehensive fundraising event occurring through the entire month of October. Rather than once more asking parents to sell products through a third party organization, Mrs. Anderson encouraged them to volunteer at least one three-hour shift at Haystackular. By establishing a "self-contained" event, the school was able to keep one hundred percent of the profits.

In exchange for their time, volunteer parents and business sponsors received a commitment from Mrs. Anderson and Dixon Primary to radically improve technologies in the classroom. As a result, parents responded with unprecedented levels of time and support. Mrs. Anderson also opened volunteer shifts to local high schools and middle school students, thus allowing them to satisfy club or scholarship volunteer hour requirements. Moreover, schools from all over the Panhandle visited the maze during school hours for a fun and educational field trip, hosted by Dixon Primary parents. On these field trips, visiting students used GPS devices to find hidden caches and navigate their way through the complex yet fun maze. Through Haystackular, Dixon Primary has earned net proceeds of more than \$80,000 in three years, and the school won the District 1 State of Florida Parent Involvement Award in 2010. Community ties were strengthened and local businesses were recognized for their contributions, with Lowe's being awarded the District Business Partner of the Year.

Throughout her educational career, Mrs. Anderson has demonstrated the ideal combination of skill, knowledge, dedication, and vision to become a principal of unique stature in the state of Florida. Her mission has been to pursue and create new ideas and programs that lead to student success. Her commitment and character are extraordinary. The Santa Rosa School District is extremely proud to recommend Mrs. Debbie Anderson as the FCITL Innovative Principal of the Year for 2013.
